Fr David joined the Oblates in 2010, did his philosophy and theology studies in India and was ordained in Chennai in 2021. After ordination, he was Assistant Priest in Kanchipuram and Kerala parishes before arriving in Melbourne in December.

He says he is open to learning and wants to preach the kingdom of God and follow in the footsteps of the Apostles, St. Eugene and all the Oblates. He is enjoying his time in Melbourne, especially the animals at Healesville Sanctuary, the National Gallery, and the Oblate hospitality.

#### **Br Thai**

My name is Thai, and I come from Vietnam. I am part of the Vietnamese delegation. The calling to become an Oblate arose from the moment I participated in the ceremony commemorating the 200th anniversary of the founding of the Congregation. I completed two years of philosophy and a year of pastoral ministry. Then, I was sent to Australia to continue my formation. I was happy to join the Oblates, as I experienced the international nature of the Oblate community, learning and sharing with brothers from different countries. I thank God for the way He prepared me and the love He has shown me.

#### **Brother Ha**

Brother Luan Ha was born in the South of Vietnam. After finishing High School, he went to the city to find a new future. Fortunately, he met and worked with Oblates for two years. In 2014, he decided to join the Oblates of Mary Immaculate. Br Luan took First Vows in 2016. Then he began his Oblate formation by studying Philosophy in Vietnam. After that, he was sent to Australia to study English and Theology. After four years of study, he has completed the required studies in Theology. He has also experienced various pastoral works in missionary settings. On the 16th of February 2024, Br Luan was ordained to become a Deacon.



#### **Brother Hieu**

My name is Vincent Nguyen Trung Hieu, but everyone calls me 'Hieu.' I hail from the southern part of Vietnam. I have spent the last 12 years living in the Missionary Oblates of Mary Immaculate. During that time, I completed four years of temporary vows, including two years of philosophy, one year of pastoral work, and one year of living in Australia. I am passionate about the Oblate Charism, which involves becoming a missionary of Good News and sharing the message of Jesus with everyone, especially those who are poor or marginalised. ## **GUA MARIA**

I am sending you some photos of "Gua Maria" where since Dutch Times there was a natural statue of Our Lady. In earlier times it was more pronounced, but the limestone process continues to drip and drop.

An earlier "Bupati" regent asked me to advertise the cave for "Religion Tourism" to help the local economy and I have done this. It is now a popular destination for Catholics to honor Our Lady. Recently a Catholic Man from Semarang gave me funds to beautify the cave, put in toilets, electricity generator etc.










There are four caves on the Island with religious significance – one for Islam – Sigit Sela (Mesjid Sesa – Mosque), Gua Rahayu for Buddist, Gua Putri for Javanese Native Religion, and all are places of pilgrimage.

The Rotary Project provides the road and bridges to their site – I send you photos we recently helped to repair Sigit Sela for Islam.

The Island is off limits to non-personnel of the Justice Department, but they tolerate pilgrims, as income helps poorer villagers adjacent to the island, selling food, drinks, coconut etc.

The Head of The Navy (Army) is taking an interest in this area as they have a Post nearby for security for the main Indonesian Oil Refinery – 35 Miles away in Cilacap.

May the year 2024 will bring so many blessing to the ministries of MAMI. I had executed the project with the support of MAMI Funds we received. ## **VIETNAM**

After the government of Vietnam opened the border to other countries, some French and Vietnamese Oblates such as Fr Roland Jacques, Fr Thom Nguyen and other Oblates who belong to the Province of France came to Vietnam to consider if the Province of France should open a new mission there. They first worked in three main areas: Hung Hoa Province, Hue Province and Sai Gon City.










After the French Province received reports from these Oblates, Father Bernard Dullier the Provincial of French Province carefully considered and then sent a request to the Superior General in Rome to open a mission in Vietnam in June 2002. However, on 17th of April 2007 Fr Superior General and his council officially decided to establish the Vietnam Mission according to the Canon Law.

Not stopping there, the Mission of Vietnam continues to grow and develop. In 2023, Father Superior General, Louis Lougen and his council decided that the Mission of Vietnam became the Delegation of Vietnam, continuing directly under the French Province.

Nowadays, the Delegation of Vietnam has five institutions for training Oblates including two houses for students or candidates, one for pre-novitiate, one for novitiate, one for philosophy and one for theology (Green)

Moreover, the Delegation of Vietnam also has different missionary communities scattered throughout the country (Red)
